# Academic Dean's Report: Dr. Maggie Aziz

Dr. Aziz's report is attached. Specific items she mentioned include:

- There is a new additional staff member in Academic Affairs Nikki Cromer.
- Dr. Andrew Kettler is now Director of Institutional Effectiveness and Academic Affairs.
- Student are still being added to dual enrollment courses. We should be patient with this process.
- Advising for summer and fall will begin in March.
- Blackboard Ultra transition will take place in the fall of 2024.

- It's important to start conversation about organizing ourselves into departments or divisions.
- Annual reviews are due January 31.
- February 1 is the first day to declare intentions for next year.
- Community College Survey of Student Engagement results are in. We did better than other campuses.
- According to Dr. Elkins, there is talk of getting an Education coordinator, similar to the Nursing Coordinator.
- Awards Day this year will be different due to the Main Building being closed. It will be held this year at Main Street Junction on Friday, April 12 from 6-8 PM. RSVPs will be required due to capacity limitations at The Junction.

Dr. Pisano discussed the need to replace Professor Torres on the Scholarship Committee. Dr. Pisano will take this position.

Dr. Aziz discussed the need to update the handbook to add a nursing faculty/staff member to the Satisfactory Academic Progress Committee. This will be voted on at the February FO meeting.

Dr. Schafer reported that she has written a grant to the Humphrey Community College Residency Program Fellowship to bring international scholars to Union for a week. There will be two scholars from Kenya and Etswatini on campus from March 23 – March 29. They will make presentations on campus and in the community.

Randy Lowell, USC Union Dean's Report January 19, 2024

- Barbara Rippy received recognition at the State House in Columbia on Wednesday, with resolutions read in her honor on the floor of the Senate and the House. She was also presented with the highest civilian honor in the state on the floor of the Senate, the Order of the Palmetto award, for the extensive philanthropy that she has an engaged in across the state for many years, benefiting USC Union, MUSC, and the School of the Deaf and Blind, to name a few. She will be celebrating her 90<sup>th</sup> birthday later this month on the 28<sup>th</sup>.
- The updated campus Mission Statements passed through all of the necessary levels of approval, through the Board of Trustees and the SC CHE, and are now officially in effect with those modifications and reflected on the website and in the bulletins.
- In 2025, USC Union will be celebrating its 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary since opening in 1965, so in the coming year, we will begin to think about what we can do to celebrate and commemorate this milestone for the campus. As we approach that milestone, we will also soon be initiating an updated Campus Master Plan process, with 2010 being the last time that we engaged in that process in collaboration with the campus and community, facilitated by Boudreaux.
- If anyone is interested in helping the school district with SAT prep for Union County High School students, Superintendent Haney is considering exploring some new options for that for those students.

#### Students

- Spring enrollment numbers for this semester are already ahead of last year's final Spring numbers, with a couple more months until the freeze date to add to those. This includes a Spring record high headcount of 1,248 as of yesterday (up 26.83% over last Spring's 984), and FTE of 725 (up 26.53% over last Spring's 573). This includes being up both in traditional student and dual enrollment student populations. Additionally, Fall applications and admits for new freshmen are well up over what they were at this time last year for the coming Fall semester.
- In December, we graduated 9 more students. Five of them earned both Associate in Arts and Associate in Science, while the other 4 earned their Associate in Arts.
- Our nursing program with USC Aiken was featured in a story in the magazine *Carolinian Health*, which goes out to USC alumni, including an interview with recent BSN grad, Makenzie Edwards.
- We continue to work toward partnering with the school of Hospitality, Retail, and Sport Management in Columbia to make more of their coursework available to our students.
- Chancellor Elkins has been in communication with Columbia and the other comprehensive campuses regarding ramping up efforts to facilitate reverse transfer degree awarding. This refers to situations where a student transfers to one of those comprehensive campuses before they had earned enough credit hours to receive our associates degree, but after having earned those hours at the other campus would be eligible and could then receive our degree at that point.
- At the Junior Olympics Qualifiers rifle meet in Charleston earlier this month, Bantams freshman, Keagan Dean, won the Silver in the Women's Air Rifle U21 division.
- USC Union Anglers, Mark Kershaw and Jacob Butts, wrapped up competition in Kissimmee, Florida last week in the MLF5 College National Championship meet, finishing in 39<sup>th</sup> place out of 135 of the best teams in the country. As a team, the USC Union Anglers are sitting in 14<sup>th</sup> place nationally in the MLF5 college trail standings.
- USC Union Softball student-athletes, Madison "Goose" Goossens, Brianna Compton, and Abby Benfield, appeared with Coach Royce on WBCU Radio last week to talk about the Bantams success in recent years, the upcoming season, and the upcoming summer invitational travel ball for three of our Bantams in Italy.

- The Research Club will be doing a Valentine's Day Bake Sale fundraiser next month, so keep an eye out for more details on that. We are also working through logistics to host an invited speaker next month, likely on February 8<sup>th</sup> or 9<sup>th</sup> from the University of Akron, Dr. Devon Carter, Assistant Professor of Special Education. Later this semester we are also trying to plan a car wash fundraiser, with funds from both fundraisers going toward a possible trip to Beaufort to learn about the Gulla culture, potentially in collaboration with the African American Alliance student group.

## Faculty/Staff News

- Thanks to Dr. Aziz for her work with USC Upstate and Union County School District to complete the Union County Fast-Track to Teaching MOU. This agreement will make it easier for students in Union to earn bachelor's degrees in early childhood education, elementary education, and middle-level education, incorporating elements of dual enrollment, USC Union associates coursework, and USC Upstate upper level bachelor's coursework to seamlessly/affordably move through those requirements.
- Congrats to Caden Jackson, Academic Success Center Coordinator, on his article that was just published in USC Columbia's *Carolina CrossTalk* magazine, entitled "Investigating Implicit Racial Biases." In the article, he summarizes his undergraduate experiences with us and the different research projects that he engaged in with me, and with Dr. Lownes and Dr. Aziz. - Macy Petty continues to do a great job spearheading the campus newspaper, the *Bantam Gazette*. Please continue to encourage students to contact her if they would be willing to write a story of their own to include in an upcoming issue of it. The Welcome Back issue that she pushed out this month is the fourth issue since she resurrected the publication last semester.
- Multiple full-time staff and faculty searches are in progress, including Palmetto College Coordinator, Disability Services Coordinator, Bursar, Head Softball Coach, Psychology, Art, Statistics, Sociology, Chemistry, Mathematics, and English.

  - Truluck Gym exterior painting, new roof, new gym floor, new ADA restrooms

  - Laurens Location WiFi upfit, bathroom remodel with ADA access, indoor fishing boat storage facility, indoor golf simulators

# **Budget**

State budget request process is kicking into high gear after the Governor released his initial version of the next round of appropriations for the upcoming fiscal year, and the House Ways and Means committee works through their meetings, including the USC slot earlier this week that President Amiridis presented at on behalf of the system. Looking to get the House version of that budget more closely aligned with the request that we had submitted for our campus, which has been the trend in more recent years.

The Union County Fast-Track to Teaching MOU has been finalized. This MOU provides an educational pathway for UCSD students to obtain a bachelor's degree in early childhood education, elementary education, or middle-level education. This agreement creates the opportunity for UCSD students to pursue an associate degree through USC Union via dual enrollment while attending high school and then transition into a bachelor's degree program in early childhood education, elementary education, or middle-level education at USC Upstate. According to this agreement, UCSD students will meet the requirements for a bachelor's degree in these education programs within 2 years.
